Ruth Huber was instrumental in founding both RWC and Tapestry Singers (the Austin Women's Chorus). She holds three music degrees, including a Master of Music in Composition from the San Francisco Conservatory, and has studied conducting at San Jose State University. Her compositions and songs have won awards from the American Choral Directors Association, the San Francisco ArtSong Competition, and the Austin Music Umbrella Songwriters Competition, and she receives commissions from choral groups around the country. A certified member of Music Teachers National Association, she teaches piano, serves as musician for the Metropolitan Community Church, and resides in San Jose with her wife, Brenda Meng, and an assortment of adorable cats.

Betsy Wagner, Co-Artistic Director, Choralographer



Betsy Wagner has a Bachelor of Arts degree in Music Education with a dual major in voice and piano from Louisiana Tech University in Ruston, LA. She has been teaching music to students in grades K-12 since 1978. Since coming to the Bay Area in 1990, she has built an award-winning choir program at Morrill Middle School in San Jose. Betsy has been singing with Rainbow Women's Chorus since 1997 and has been co-director since 2000. She creates the choralography for RWC performances and, in the fall of 2003, helped found RWC's small ensemble, Vocal InFusion. According to her mom, her natural musical ability showed up at the early age of two, when she played "Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star" by ear on her toy piano.

Kathy Disney, Accompanist



Kathy Disney, accompanist, has a Bachelor of Music degree in Music Education from San Jose State University. She teaches general music to students in grades K-3 at Eaton and Collins Elementary Schools and serves as director for the children's choir and substitute pianist/organist at St. Jude's Episcopal Church in Cupertino. She is a member of MENC (National Association for Music Education), and AOSA (American Orff Schulwerk Association), with a Level II certification in the Orff Schulwerk. Our Story

Rainbow Women's Chorus is a 501 (c)(3) nonprofit corporation governed by the Action Circle, a group of women dedicated to realizing the organization's mission. Chorus members began singing together in 1996, presenting concerts in venues such as Christ the Good Shepherd Lutheran Church, Le Petit Trianon Theatre, Triton Museum, and for Festival 2000, the San Jose Center for the Performing Arts. The chorus also performs at church services, diversity celebrations, awards ceremonies, community meetings and private events.

Rainbow Women's Chorus is a member of the Gay and Lesbian Association of Choruses and was the proud cohosts, with SVGMC, of GALA's Festival 2000 here in San Jose—ten days and over 5000 singers. RWC has since participated in GALA Festivals in 2004 (Montreal) and 2008 (Miami). In February 2006, members of RWC sang with a dozen other choruses at a benefit at Carnegie Hall in NYC, Timothy Selig conducting. In July 2010, members of RWC attended the Sister Singers Women's Choral Festival in Chicago.

Silicon Valley Gay Men's Chorus was instrumental in founding Rainbow Women's Chorus in 1996, a bond forged even stronger by co-hosting GALA Festival 2000 in San Jose, and we have maintained a family connection ever since. Program Notes

Together Wherever We Go

Our concert opens with this upbeat Broadway classic from the musical, *Gypsy*, which expresses our delight at the opportunity to share the stage once again.

Fishing (with the Lesbians)

Commissioned by Chicago's Artemis Singers, "Fishing (With the Lesbians)" is dedicated to the memory of one of its founding members, Michaeline Chvatal, who succumbed to breast cancer in 2008. "Mikey," as she was known to her many friends, was a tireless volunteer and participant in many community arts organizations. An avid member of Artemis' small barbershop ensemble, "Queertette," she also loved to dance, play poker and volleyball, and yes, go fishing...with the Lesbians.

Tango

Solfège is a system for naming musical notes that dates back to the eleventh century. Most people will recognize the basic solfège syllables from *The Sound of Music*'s "Do-Re-Mi." Singers often use the syllables when learning to read music. The words to "Tango" are all in solfège, adding an educational component to this Argentinian-flavored dance melody.

I Dreamed a Dream

From the Broadway musical *Les Misérables*, "I Dreamed a Dream" is a haunting lament, sung by the anguished, dying and impoverished Fantine, who thinks back to happier days and wonders at all that has gone wrong in her life. Susan Boyle's 2009 recording became a huge hit, especially in Ireland and Britain.

Somebody to Love

The rock ballad "Somebody to Love" was first recorded by Queen on their 1976 album, *A Day at the Races*. Influenced by

Aretha Franklin, the song has a gospel feel and speaks of love and faith. The song became popular again after appearing on an episode of television's *GLEE* in 2009. We bring you the *GLEE* arrangement featuring solo voices with the whole chorus singing backup.

Man! I Feel Like a Woman

Shania Twain's performance of the sassy "Man! I Feel Like a Woman" won her a Grammy in 2000. It also helped her secure a contract with cosmetics company Revlon, which used the tune in TV ads featuring Twain. The song has also been performed by others, including Carrie Underwood and Britney Spears.

Build Me Up Buttercup

"Build Me Up Buttercup" was released by The Foundations with Colin Young singing the lead vocals in 1968. The song has been re-recorded many times, and has been featured in a number of movies. This version was arranged by longtime SVGMC friend Galt Johnson.

The Most Living Moment

The text for this piece is from a poem by Rumi, a thirteenth-century Persian Islamic writer and mystic. The poem begins: "The most living moment comes when those who love each other meet each other's eyes" and continues by describing the depths of a loving relationship that contains both scolding and laughter. The lush musical setting is by contemporary composer David N. Childs.

Ritmo

"Ritmo" is an energetic and complex piece for choir, two pianists, and hand percussion. The Spanish text translates as:

"Rhythm. Clap your hands to the rhythm. Capably. Clap your hands to the rhythm. Sing in joyful chorus with love and hope. We will sing in rhythm. We will sing in chorus. We will sing in rhythm. Lift your voices (all the voices.) Life your heart



with musical instruments. We will sing of freedom and love. Make harmony. Let's go sing and play. All voices, all people – capably, with all voices, with instruments, with hope and with rhythm. Clap your hands to the rhythm. Clap your hands with all the people, with all voices, with happiness, and with joy. We will sing with joy, with love and hope. We will sing of peace. We will sing of love. We will sing with happiness and with joy. Rhythm. ”

Drama Queen

Composer Eric Lane Barnes is Assistant Artistic Director of Seattle Men's Chorus, the largest men's chorus in the country. In "Drama Queen", the chorus bewails everything that has happened since the moment of birth. Perhaps our rendition will spark a glimmer of recognition for the drama queens we know and love.

Seize the Day

"Seize the Day" is from *Newsties*, Walt Disney's 1992 film musical, loosely based on the true story of the New York newspaper boy strike of 1899. The uplifting part of this tale focuses on a group of young newspaper sellers who decide to take a stand. SVGMC singers have personally embraced it, some hear in it the current struggle for marriage equality, some about the problem of bullying in our society, and some the struggle for the right to just gather together as gay men.

Sometimes When We Touch

"Sometimes When We Touch" was a hit single for lyricist Dan Hill in 1978. Since then it has been recorded by many popular singers, and took hold internationally. It speaks to honesty, fear, and intimacy.

Two, Too Wet

This wet and wonderful piece is a medley of two water-related rock and roll hits: "Splish Splash" and "Sea Cruise."

Pirate Song

This song premiered April 2006 by the University of Colorado Golden Buffalo Men's Chorus: "because sometimes you just need to say 'Arrrr'."

Bridge over Troubled Water

"Bridge over Troubled Water" is the title song of Simon & Garfunkel's album of the same name, released in 1970. It held the #1 spot on the Billboard charts for six weeks. It inspires us to be there for one another as we encourage each other never to give up in our life's journey.

Who We Are

"Who We Are" was inspired by a talk given by Buddhist meditation teacher, Tara Brach. She described how we develop false identities that mask our natural beauty and wholeness, and explored how we can transcend these illusions to glimpse the "presence and love that is peering through." Originally a solo song, this arrangement of "Who We Are" was written by Ruth Huber for the Palo Alto Unitarian Universalist Church Choir.



It Takes a Village

Composer Joan Szymko based this song on the West African saying, "It takes a village to raise a child." The piece consists of several very different parts layered upon one another, all working together to make the whole, to create the joyful spirit that arises in celebration of the growth of a child.

Stand Together

Composer Jim Papoulis wrote this piece at a Choral Music Experience conference in 2005. He notes that song expresses the spirit of the event: "striving together towards a goal; encouragement for the individual and the group; exploration of unique inner strengths that make the whole more viable, more vibrant." The Celtic flavor was inspired by singer Noirin ni Riain.
